RSIC Resources Deployed During Davis Fire

(Reno, NV) - The Davis Fire started Saturday, September 7th at or near Davis Creek Regional Park in Washoe Valley. It burned nearly 6,000 acres, 11 homes and three other structures, including the Holy Spirit Catholic Mission. Most of the homes lost were in the Washoe Valley area. Washoe County School District in addition, cancelled classes for all schools for 2 days. Thereafter, they cancelled 10 WSCD schools for the remainder of the week.

By September 8th, more than 20,000 people were evacuated from their homes. The same day a Declaration of Emergency for the Davis Fire was signed by Governor Lombardo with hun-

dreds of homes and lives threatened, as well as critical infrastructure in Washoe County.

The Davis fire was exasperated by dry conditions, high temperatures and severe wind. Plus, Washoe County was experiencing a resource shortage in fire personnel due to all the fires in the western states. To include significant economic obligations resulting from the short-term response and long-term recovery for the affected individuals and areas.

Since our collaboration in Unified Command during COVID-19 with Washoe County Emergency Services and a recent Memorandum of Understand-

ing (MOU) with Washoe County Sheriff's Office, they now include RSIC in their Incident Action Plans (IAPs).

The Southwest Area Incident Management in coordination with Washoe County, City of Reno, City of Sparks, Truckee Meadows Fire, USFS and BLM, deployed RSIC's Emergency Services and resources.

Tribal Police were immediately deployed to help escort evacuees out of the fire zone on September 7th. Hungry Valley Fire was deployed to fill in for Truckee Meadows Fire for local Spanish Springs emergencies while their firefighters were deployed to the Davis Fire itself.

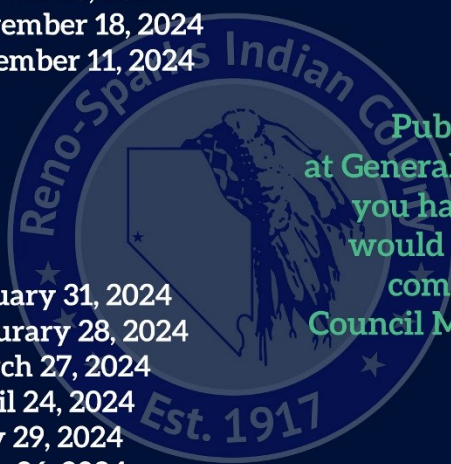

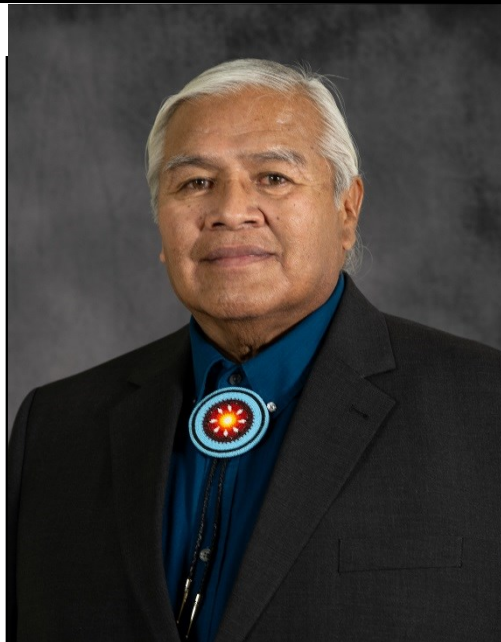
This past week on September 22nd was the Fall Equinox. It's the day that there is equal parts of light and darkness. It's the world in balance. Fall is a special time for our people as we gather food and medicine and prepare for the cold months ahead.

I was lucky enough to partake in pinenut (Tagim—Washiw; Tuba—Numu; Devah—Newe) gathering with my family near Markleeville, CA. Pinenuts have been sparse over the last 5 years and this year it was actually plentiful everywhere in the Great Basin. I enjoyed the peacefulness of the pinenut groves where our ancestors also enjoyed gathering. I hope your families had the opportunity to do the same. We thank Creator and Mother Earth for providing for all our relations.

Which leads me to mention our Native Day 2024 Celebration on Friday, September 27th at the Reno Gym presented by our Language & Culture Program. There was a March through our Reno community, we had community contests for panbread, war hoop, youth and adults handdrum contests with entertainment by Hovia Edwards, a flautist and singer. Language & Culture was also able to share pinenuts to go along with the celebration.

Here is my update for the community on what Tribal Council and I have been working on for the month of August:

Post Numaga Indian Days Powwow & Handgames—I'd also like to thank our Powwow and



Handgame Committees for showcasing RSIC's homelands and tribe with a positive, everlasting impression on our visitors from near and far. This year's Numaga Indian Days was a huge success. We are definitely growing.

We had over 50 vendors, over 200 dancers and over 10K attendees. I believe our marketing grants from Reno-Sparks Convention & Visitors Authority and Travel Nevada really gave us the boost to capture more attendees than ever. Our Public Relations Office was able to execute a marketing campaign that targeted our desired audience through TV advertising on Channel 2 News and KOLO 8, targeted digital, social media and billboards in the Reno DMA. Solely with the targeted digital campaign we had 281 new visitors to the Powwow.

Every event had a lot of participants to include the Princess Pageant, RSTHC's Health Fair, 3NWC's Warrior Run/Walk and

Recreation's Strong Man Competition.

Also with our new Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Washoe County Sheriff's, they were able to provide visible patrols during the Powwow for extra security. They even deployed the Raven Helicopter to do air patrol.

Thank you to all our staff and leadership who worked as a team to make Nevada's Largest Powwow spectacular. For instance, our Tribal Health Center and Three Nations Wellness, Public Works, Recreation, Finance, Tribal Police, Legal Dept., Emergency Services & HV Fire, UNITY, Language & Culture, IT Dept., Front Admin Office, Public Relations, TA Office, Chairman's Office, Tribal Secretary and Tribal Council. I'm looking forward to Numaga Indian Days 2025.

POLITICS & NETWORKING

- I'm continuing to build relationships with our federal, state and local politicians. During the month of September, Candace, RSIC Planning Director, Joel Korotkin, Economic Development Manager, Duane Sherman,

Tribal Administrator, and Brett Scholari, Strategies 360 Senior Vice-President of Government Relations and I met with the NDOT Director, Tracy Larkin Thomason. We further discussed the surplus acreage, next to the freeway and our encroachment permit. In addition, we asked to see what steps we have to take to acquire the land.

I met with the Washoe County Manager, Eric Brown. This was an introduction meeting for relationship building. Yet, we still discussed regional planning to include housing, roads, water. Eric expressed the importance of being inclusive of RSIC for future planning. They recognize what they plan affects our tribal community and vice versa.

I also met with Washoe County School District Superintendent, Joe Ernst. We spoke about improving access to education for tribal students, working more fluently with our RSIC Education Staff, culture focused programming, and the excessive absenteeism & truancy. We have a lot of work to do, but thankful for our partnerships.

On September 14th, myself, Duane Sherman, Tribal Administrator and Angie Wilson, RSTHC Director attended a Senator Schatz Tribal Leaders Meet & Greet hosted by Summit Lake Paiute Tribe. Senator Schatz is the Chairman of the U.S. Senate Committee on Indian Affairs. This Meet & Greet was a campaign stop for Senator Rosen. Senator Schatz is a close friend of Senator Rosen. He discussed accomplishments he and Rosen had

made in supporting Tribal issues and offered an opportunity to directly hear from Nevada Tribes and more specifically from RSIC. Such as law enforcement needs and tribal healthcare advocacy. It's great to know our voices were heard.

Register to Vote for General Elections- I encourage ALL TRIBAL MEMBERS AND RESIDENTS 18+ YEARS to register to vote! You can register to vote online at www.RegisterToVote.NV.gov or call Secretary of State's Office at 775-684-5705.

The EASE Program also launched for online voting for tribal citizens who live on a reservation or colony to use this system. The digital voting option is part of an effort to increase voter turnout among the state's Native American communities. To vote online, go to www.NVEASE.gov.

RSIC will be working with our federal and state lobbyist to support political leaders who support Reno-Sparks Indian Colony, Nevada Tribes and Tribes in general.

RSIC has confirmed our polling locations for the presidential election.

- ✦ Early Voting (Oct 19th-Nov 1st) at Reno Multipurpose Room for in-person, ballot drop off and same-day registration.
- ✦ Early Voting (Oct 19th-Nov 1st) at Smoke Shop 6 in Spanish Springs for ballot drop off only.
- ✦ General Election Voting (Nov 5th) at Reno Gym and HV Gym for in-person and same-day registration.

Law Enforcement, Emergency Services and HV Fire – I'd like to commend our Tribal Police, Emergency Services, HV Fire, PIO and Cultural Resources working as a part of the Unified Command during the Davis Fire. This affected tribal members, employees and over 200 RSTHC patients living in South Reno. During the Davis Fire, I was able to speak to Governor Lombardo about the response and met with National Guard Major General Ondra L. Berry. They all were impressed with RSIC's response.

Furthermore, Tribal Police and PIO organized 2 Amber Alert Trainings from the National Criminal Justice Training Center of Fox Valley Technical College. This happened on September 6th & 7th. There were 42 participants overall. The FVTC crew was amazed at how advanced RSIC is in organizing emergency response through the ICS trainings.

Additionally, HV Fire responded to 2 fires near Hungry Valley due to lightning strikes. The fires were off colony, but they worked in partnership with BLM Fire and Truckee Meadows Fire to extinguish the fire. Awesome job.

We have many upcoming events, such as, Hungry Valley Community Cleanup, Halloween Community Trick or Treating & Events, Craft Fairs, Senior Fun Day, UNITY Pumpkin Patch at TLC Building, Nevada Day Parade, plus many more events. Stay informed by RSIC's newsletter, website and RSIC's social media.

Preserving the Past to Ensure the Future

Orvis Ring Elementary School

Many Reno-Sparks Indian Colony children attended Orvis Ring Elementary School and was bussed here daily from the Colony.

"Orvis Ring Grammar School, in Reno's north-east quadrant, was the second in the quartet of Mission-style schools designed by architect George A. Ferris and built between 1909 and 1912. Orvis Ring opened for students in the spring semester of 1910. The school was located on Evans Avenue between Seventh and Eighth Streets, across from the home of B. D. Billinghamurst, the superintendent of Reno schools.

Orvis Ring School was dedicated in February of 1910 and named for Orvis Ring, an early Nevada educator and then-Superintendent of Public Instruction, who was known for his inspirational guidance of students and died in September 1910. The school quickly became an important institution in the community with an active P.T.A. and proud student body.

By the early 1970s, Reno was once again faced with an expanding population and aging schools. All four of the Spanish Quartet had come under threat of demolition, and in 1974, Mary S. Doten was the first to come down. Mount Rose School was retained, while McKinley Park was sold to the City of Reno. Orvis Ring School was kept open through 1975, but the cost to renovate it was deemed too high. The school was demolished in 1978 and replaced with a low-income senior apartment complex in 1986. In recognition of the school, the apartment complex was named Orvis Ring Senior Apartments." Source: www.renohistorical.org

RSIC's Cultural Resource Program Manager, Michon Eben was also deployed to help USFS & BLM archeologists identify cultural sites in danger of the fire and mitigate any possible damage. Luckily, all cultural sites were saved.

On September 11th, high winds challenged fire crews all day, grounding aircraft that had been critical at fighting the blaze. The Southwest Incident Management Team was concerned the winds could potentially make the fire grow and move towards the homes. Under the Unified Command, RSIC was asked to get resources ready in case the worst happened.

RSIC's Incident Management Team (ICS) held a meeting to organize our IAP at the Tribal Health Center. This meeting included the RSIC/RSTHC Emergency Services Depts., Tribal Police, RSTHC, Hungry Valley Fire, Public Works, Public Relations Dept., Tribal Administrator and Chairman's Of-

fice.

With the help of the new data software, geospatial data tool with the Population Health Analytics system at RSTHC, RSIC was able to get information within a few minutes to see that over 200 RSTHC Patients were affected by the evacuations. As well as over 10 Urban RSIC Tribal Members and employees. The advancement of these systems allows the RSTHC opportunities that could not be as quickly achieved 2-years ago.

At the meeting, RSIC prepared for our response and collaboration, if needed:

- ✦ RSTHC was ready for an influx of patients for medical/pharmacy/behavioral health needs during the fire & was ready to deploy mobile clinic if needed.
- ✦ RSIC Stockpile was ready to distribute necessities to tribal evacuees.
- ✦ Tribal Police would continue to help escort evacuees without hindering regular

community patrols.

- ✦ HV Fire would continue to backup and respond to emergencies while Truckee Meadows Fire was deployed to the fire.
- ✦ Culture Resources continued to work with USFS and BLM to identify endangered cultural sites during the fire.
- ✦ PIO was in constant contact with the Joint Information Center to provide correct information about the fire and RSIC services.
- ✦ RSIC Tribal Council to approve Declaration of Emergency for reimbursement purposes.

Chairman Daryl D. Gardipe and Duane Sherman Sr., Tribal Administrator, attended Governor Lombardo's Press Conference. They had the opportunity to speak directly to the Governor about the Davis Fire and response. Chairman also met with the National Guard Major General, Ondra L. Berry.

The next day, the Southwest Incident Management Team provided a presentation to our Tribal Council at the September General Council Meeting to discuss potential dangers.

"RSIC was honored to help and support those affected by the Davis Fire," said Chairman Gardipe.

The feedback from many of our RSIC Tribal Members & Urban Indian patients was extremely positive for the quick response and support.

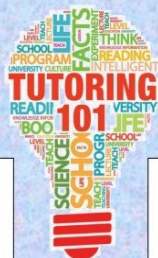

NEVADA DENTAL 1115 DEMONSTRATION WAIVER APPROVED BY CMS

An 1115 Demonstration Waiver is a program under the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) that allows states to design and improve their Medicaid programs. 1115 demonstration waivers are usually a five-year temporary allowance. A waiver gives states the flexibility to waive certain provisions of Medicaid law and try new approaches. The CMS approves these waivers to support innovation that meets the programs goals and does not increase the cost to the federal government. Therefore, any such 1115 demonstration waiver must be "budget neutral" in order to be considered allowable.

In July 2022, Nevada Department of Health Care Finance and Policy (NDHCFP), also known as Nevada Medicaid, held tribal consultation with the Nevada Tribes on a dental 1115 demonstration waiver to expand various services for adult Medicaid beneficiaries with a diagnosis of Diabetes (Type I and II). However, the State did not include Nevada Tribal Clinics as eligible participating programs.

Upon my arrival as the Director of the Reno Sparks Tribal Health Center in August 2022, I began advocacy to the state to reconsider the exclusion and furthermore amend the waiver to include the tribal health clinics as part of the 1115 waiver. Services provided to and paid on behalf of American Indian and Alaskan Native (AI/AN) Medicaid beneficiaries is 100% reimbursed to the State by the Federal Government, therefore, making services at tribal clinics "budget neutral". Due to the advocacy of the Reno Sparks Indian Colony, the State changed its position and amended their 1115 waiver to include tribal health clinics as participating programs.






Nevada Department of Health Care Finance and Policy has announced the formal approval of the Whole Mouth, Whole Body Connection 1115 dental demonstration waiver by CMS. This is a significant milestone achieved on behalf of our AI/AN Medicaid beneficiaries and tribal clinics.

We are now working with the State Dental Director, Department of Health Care Finance and Policy, and state fiscal intermediary to determine required clinical data markers for expanded services and billing allowances for Medicaid adults with a Diabetes diagnosis (Type I and Type 2). The state hopes to have all criteria in place so we can begin this effort in the next few months.

As a result of our efforts, AI/AN Medicaid beneficiaries with a diabetes diagnosis, will become eligible to receive a limited dental benefit package, including diagnostic, preventative, restorative, endodontic, and periodontic dental services through the provider network of federally qualified health centers and participating tribal health centers with dental clinics.

The new benefit is limited to five (5) encounters annually per eligible Medicaid beneficiary. Currently, RSTHC has 151 patients who fit this criteria. We are proud to advocate for tribal clinics to be included in the 1115 Waiver and our continued effort to champion this effort on behalf of our patients.

The 1115 Demonstration Waiver seeks to achieve the following goals:

-  Increase access to preventative dental services for participating enrollees
-  Decrease hospital admissions for the demonstration population due to non-management of oral health needs
-  Control or reduce the incidence of periodontal disease among the demonstration population
-  Reduce emergency room visits related to non-management of diabetic conditions among the demonstration population
-  Reduce levels of A1C hemoglobin levels, or improve management of A1C levels for the demonstration population

Healthy Habits = Healthy Eyes

If you wear contact lenses, keep your eyes healthy and prevent eye infections by following these tips:

YOUR HABITS

- Wash and dry your hands before touching your contact lenses.
- Don't sleep in your contact lenses (unless your eye doctor tells you otherwise).
- Avoid wearing contact lenses while showering, swimming, or using a hot tub.

YOUR SUPPLIES

- Rub and rinse your contact lenses with solution each time you clean them. Never use water or spit!
- Use only the solution your eye doctor tells you to use.
- Only use fresh disinfecting solution in your case—don't mix new with old.
- Never store your contact lenses in water.
- Replace your contact lenses as often as your eye doctor says.
- Rub and rinse your case every day with solution, dry with a clean tissue, and store upside down with the caps off.
- Get a new case at least every three months.

YOUR EYE DOCTOR

- Visit your eye doctor once a year—or more often if needed.
- Ask questions about how to care for your lenses and case.
- Take out your contact lenses and call your eye doctor if you have eye pain, red eyes, or blurred vision.

And remember: always be prepared! Carry a pair of glasses in case you need to take out your contact lenses.

A Resurgence of COVID-19 Infections in RSIC Community

As the Chief Medical Officer (CMO) for the Reno-Sparks Tribal Health Center, I am taking this opportunity to communicate about both an ongoing hazard to the health and safety of the community and an opportunity to protect yourselves and your families.

We are seeking a resurgence of COVID-19 infections nationally, but especially now in the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony Community. There are two new COVID-19 strains: K.P.3.1.1 and KP.3 that have emerged recently.

A few weeks ago, we received the first part of our COVID 19 vaccine order and have the updated Moderna vaccines for Fall of 2024 available now at the Reno-Sparks Tribal Health Center.

COVID-19 Vaccinations are currently recommended for those over 65 years of age with multiple medical conditions or immune-compromised (remember Diabetes is an immunocompromised condition), pregnancy and for children six months to seventeen years of age. If other people want the vaccination, we will do our best to accommodate their request as vaccination supplies permit. Hopefully in the near-term we will have plenty for everyone.

It is important to understand that the vaccine does not attack your DNA (misinformation), but it



does cause the production of the COVID-19 spike protein and then results in the immune system producing an antibody against the COVID-19 spike protein. By generating an antibody response, we can slow or mitigate the severity of any COVID infection that comes after immunizations. Following immunizations, the antibody produce will bind to the spike protein of any infecting COVID-19 virus and kill it before it can begin to replicate or infect your cells. Unfortunately, the vaccine has not been 100 % effective at prevention, but it does lower the rate of death or serious complications, including hospitalizations, for those that are immunized. Unfortunately, immunity either from having COVID-19 infections or vaccinations is not permanent and decreases progressively over time, and is usually ineffective after six months. Hence the need for recurrent vaccinations.

We are encouraging everyone in the community to get a COVID immunization as soon

as possible. Data have shown that you can also get a Flu shot and RSV shot along with a COVID all at the same time if you wish (RSTHC Flu Pod on 10/9, 10am-6pm). Alternatively, you can and get them done at different times. I recommend considering getting one a week apart if you do not want them all at one time.

Side effects of any immunization can include soreness at the injection site, feeling mildly ill or having mild cold symptoms, but usually not longer than 48-72 hours after immunization. Tylenol or Advil can provide symptomatic relief of discomfort caused by immunizations. Keep yourself well hydrated too.

For your information, in 2023 more than 916,300 people were hospitalized for COVID-19 infections in the USA. Moreover, more than 75,500 people died from COVID infection in 2023. By comparison, 44,900 people died of Influenza in 2023. These statistics come from Dr. Michelle Barron of the University of California and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). Specifically, Nevada had 892,252 cases of COVID infections and 12,084 deaths in 2023. Please, do not become a statistic in 2024. I was a proud member of our RSIC negotiation team in transitioning our clinic from a Title I Self-Determination Contract into a Title V Self-Governance Compact.











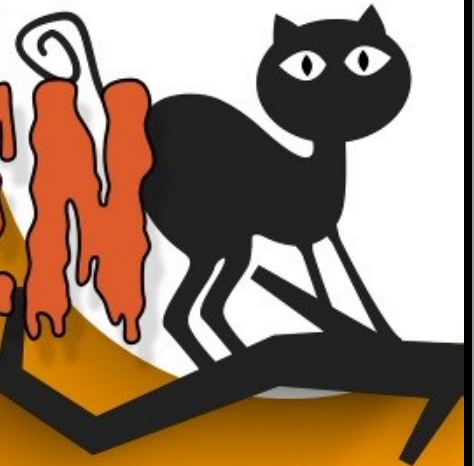

October is Emergency Preparedness Month

Hello RSIC community and staff! This month is dedicated to emergency preparedness. When an emergency incident happens, it often occurs when we least expect it.

Always being ready for an emergency can help you and your family remain calm, act effectively, work together, and save lives. There are several things that can be done to ensure you are prepared and ready to act when faced with an emergency incident. Some helpful places to start consist of gathering resources and assembling an emergency kit or "go bag", developing and implementing an evacuation plan, staying well informed of an ongoing emergency event, and ultimately staying calm during an emergency.

When assembling your emergency kit, here are some key items to consider. Water is one of the biggest essentials needed during an event and you should have at least a three-day supply with at least one gallon of water per person per day. In addition to water, food is a must. Be sure to have at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food. This can be in the form of canned meats, fruits and vegetables, powdered milk or juice, and high energy foods such as peanut butter, jelly, crackers, granola bars, and trail mix. Another good resource to include is a first aid



kit. This can be assembled based on your personal and family needs but can typically include non-prescription drugs, band aids, gauze, and antiseptic. Be sure to include at least one complete change of clothing and footwear per person. Ensure that the clothing is appropriate for the time of year. One resource that is often overlooked is sanitation and special items. It is recommended to have items such as toilet paper, soap, feminine supplies, garbage bags, diapers, formula, bottles, and any other personal hygiene items needed. It is also important to have some number of tools in your emergency kit such as a radio, flashlight, batteries, tape, and any other essentials you decide is important. Remember, you may need to survive on your own after a disaster as local officials may not be able to reach everyone immediately.

An emergency disaster can happen anywhere at any time. Hav-

ing advance preparation can make the difference between life and death. Prior to a disaster, you and your family must have a plan. You can begin with discussing the potential hazards with your family. Additionally, you can develop emergency escape routes that include a location for you and your family to meet at if separated. Ensure that you have the means to travel to your designated location by keeping a full tank of gas in your car if evacuation seems likely, making transportation arrangements with family or friends, and leaving early enough to avoid being trapped. Be sure to include pets in your plan. Don't forget to gather your supplies and any other important items.

Lastly and above all, stay informed. Having knowledge of the possible disasters that affect your area is extremely advantageous during any preparedness plan. Here are a couple of helpful tips to consider when preparing for a disaster. The first step is knowing the potential risks and hazards that you and your household can face. The second step is knowing how and where to obtain relevant and current information during an emergency. Some good sources of information are local television stations, radio emergency alerts, and credible social media accounts and other reliable internet-based communications.

**RSIC meets Senator Brian Schatz (D-HI),
Chairman of the U.S. Senate Committee on Indian Affairs**
at a Nevada Tribal Leaders Meet & Greet hosted by Summit Lake Paiute Tribe



Chairman Daryl D. Gardipe, Duane Sherman, Sr., Tribal Administrator and Angie Wilson, RSTHC Director met with Nevada Tribal leaders and Senator Brian Schatz (D-HI), Chairman of the U.S. Senate Committee on Indian Affairs. The Nevada Tribal Leaders Meet & Greet was hosted by the Summit Lake Tribe. The meeting was centered around the importance of the upcoming election and how critical it is we vote for Senator Rosen. Senator Schatz is a close friend of Senator Rosen. He discussed accomplishments he and Rosen had made in supporting Tribal issues. In addition, Senator Schatz encouraged an important discussion on key issues impacting the Nevada Tribes.

After consulting with the Chair-

man, Tribal Administrator Duane Sherman Sr, presented on behalf of RSIC and brought to the Senator's attention the disparity in resources and investigations associated with MMIP throughout the nation including the demographic information for the Nevada and its tribal communities.

RSIC also discussed the last three years of year over year increases to the Bureau of Indian Affairs budget (green book) and the lack of increased funding for tribes. As RSIC has received the same amount of funding since 1978. We described in detail the need for law enforcement increases especially as the BIA-Office of Justice Services has pulled funding from the rural Northern Nevada tribes for detention/housing of

individuals and has asked that tribes pick up this cost going forward. RSIC conveyed to the Senator that RSIC receives \$472,000 dollars for general law enforcement, but the program is supported by RSIC at nearly 5Xs above the BIA base budget.

We discussed the need to have present-day budgets based upon actual current cost(s). The cost of services in 1978 for the Reno Sparks Indian Colony was much different than today, the price of gas was .50 cents a gallon compared to today at \$5.00 a gallon.

In addition, Director Wilson provided health advocacy including, but not limited to the following:

- ✦ Provide full and mandatory funding to the Indian Health Service. As Congress reaf-

firmed its duty to provide for Indian health care when it enacted the Indian Health Care Improvement Act (IHCIA), declaring it is the policy of this Nation, in fulfillment of its special trust responsibilities and legal obligations, to ensure the highest possible health status of American Indians and Alaskan Natives (AIANs) and to provide all resources necessary to affect that policy. These legal obligations and responsibilities remain unfulfilled and Indian Country remains in a health crisis to this day.

- ✦ Permanently exempt tribes, tribal programs and Urban Indian Organizations from budget cuts, sequestration and recessions. There are numerous federal reports and findings, the IHS is

chronically underfunded, with current estimates for full funding being roughly 7 times greater than the amounts enacted by Congress. The IHS budget remains so small in comparison to the national budget that spending cut or budget control measures would not result in any meaningful savings in the national debt but would devastate our Tribes and Citizens across Indian Country.

- ✦ End the Practice of competitive grant making where not required by statute, and as appropriate, distribute funds to Tribes through the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (ISDEAA) agreements, contracts and compacts, making such funds eligible for Contract Support Costs and

eliminating burdensome grant administration.

- ✦ Ensure the Office of Management and Budget is engaged in the Tribal budget Formulation for Meaningful engagement.
- ✦ Preserve Medicaid, Medicare and the Children's Health Insurance Program, as these programs provide critical access to care for our AIAN people and are the only concrete opportunity for tribes to offset critical IHS funding disparities through third party reimbursement such as Medicaid and Medicare.

The advocacy was well received and the response from Senate leadership is not only appreciated, but imperative in addressing ongoing efforts to strengthen our tribal nations overall.
